Newsletter The Thirty-Second Sunday of the Year Nove

Dear parishioners at St. Mary's and St. Paul's,

We are approaching the final few weeks of the church's liturgical year and the readings begin to invite us to reflect on our final destiny. Today's parable about the ten bridesmaids (Matthew 25:1-13) invites us to such reflection. I offer some words by Pope Francis on this Sunday's Gospel:

"What does Jesus wish to teach us with this parable? He reminds us that we must be ready for the encounter with him. Many times, in the Gospel, Jesus exhorts keeping watch, and he does so at the end of this narrative. He says: "Therefore, stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour." But with this parable he tells us that keeping watch means more than simply not sleeping, but to be ready. In fact all the maidens are asleep before the bridegroom's arrival, but upon waking some are ready and others not. Thus here is the meaning of being wise and prudent: it is a matter of not waiting until the last moment of our lives to cooperate with the grace of God, but rather to do so now. It would be good to consider for a moment: one day will be the last. If it were today, how prepared am I? But I must do this and that; be ready as if it were the last day. This does us good!

The lamp is a symbol of the faith that illuminates our life, while the oil is a symbol of the charity that nourishes the light of faith, making it fruitful and credible. The condition for being prepared for the encounter with the Lord is not only faith, but a Christian life abundant with love and charity for our neighbour. If we allow ourselves to be guided by what seems more comfortable, by seeking our own interests, then our life becomes barren, incapable of giving life to others, and we accumulate no reserve of oil for the lamp of our faith. And this faith will be extinguished at the moment of the Lord's coming, or even before. If instead we are watchful and seek to do good with acts of love, of sharing, of service to a neighbour in difficulty, then we can be at peace while we wait for the bridegroom to come. The Lord can come at any moment, and even the slumber of death does not frighten us, because we have a reserve of oil, accumulated through everyday good works. Faith inspires charity and charity safeguards faith."

Annual Census of those attending Sunday Mass in Scotland: last week we were asked by the bishop to record the number of people attending Mass and the numbers are as follows: Vigil Mass, 141; Sunday Morning 9am, 92; 10.30am 207, which makes the total **440 people.** It's good for us to know this and reflect on where we are as a parish community in terms of church attendance. It points to the accuracy of the diocesan figures which suggest a drop of 58% over the last ten years across the whole Diocese of Motherwell. Please speak about the life of the church with your family and friends and encourage one another to support the ministry of the church. Every day we watch the news we can see how vital the Gospel of Jesus is for the wellbeing of society.

New Mass Times at St. Mary's Church: the Vigil Mass will move to 5pm and the Sunday Masses will be at 9am and 10.30am. Thankfully it looks as though we need our 9am Mass.

Catholic Education Week: Annual Motherwell Diocesan Education Mass: Motherwell Cathedral on Thursday November 16th, the Feast of St. Margaret at 7pm: please join Bishop Toal for this special liturgy to pray for the Head-teachers, teachers and pupils in our Catholic Schools. Let us do all we can to support the church in the important work of handing on and celebrating the Christian Faith. A second collection will be taken up next week to support the Catholic Education Office.
