Seventh Sunday of the Year

February 18th 2024

My dear parishioners at St. Mary's and St. Paul's,

I hope this finds you and your families well as we journey towards Springtime and the promise of abundant new life. Journey or perhaps pilgrimage are good words to describe the Wellspring Pastoral Project, which was launched last Sunday and also *Lent*, which began with the receiving of our ashes on Wednesday or Thursday of this week. Such moments invite us to embrace our Christian Faith more deeply, with thanksgiving, for all the beauty it brings into our lives and into our families, and to share with others the love that Christ has for us. Faith and Life go hand in hand.

As we set out on Wellspring and Lent perhaps our first priority should be for those who are the most vulnerable in our community, especially those who are ill or frail or those who have some type of special need. Do you have a member of your family or a neighbour who would like to receive Holy Communion at home? With their permission, please write down their names and addresses and telephone numbers and hand them into the sacristy or telephone the church house and pass on this important information that way. We also have our three nursing homes, *Douglas View*, Lornebank and Avonbridge and it would be good to know if any of the residents would like a pastoral visit. The first step is in finding out the names of those who would appreciate a visit and the strength and blessing of Holy Communion.

A second priority is our care for those who are very young, especially through the Children's Liturgy at our 10.30am Mass on a Sunday morning. It is clearly important to try to share the gospel message in a way that is appropriate to their understanding; this catechetical work also strengthens our relationship with our schools. If this is something you think you could help with then please make yourself known.

Finally, perhaps the most vulnerable person on the planet is the unborn child. Somehow it felt timely to receive information this week from *Right To Life*. They sent leaflets describing the wonderful story of babies Harry and Harvey, and I invite you to take the information home and reflect on its message. Let us be a parish that is on the side of life, every life, from the womb to the tomb. What does this mean? It means, without condemnation of anyone, to hold sacred the miracle of human existence and to attend to it with great love and compassion and solidarity. Now that would be a Wellspring of grace and a Lent to remember! Father O'Brien

A Message from Right To Life: please support an amendment to reduce our abortion law from 24 weeks to 22 weeks. Babies born prematurely at 22 weeks are thriving and there is a contradiction in our abortion law. Collect a postcard today from the back of the church and post it to your MP in support of this amendment. This proposed amendment is supported by a large cross-party group of MPs. The latest guidance from the British association of Perinatal-Medicine enables doctors to intervene to save premature babies from 22 weeks. Research indicates that a significant number of babies born at 22 or 23 weeks can now survive outside the womb.
