### Second Sunday of the Year

January 14<sup>th</sup> 2024

*My dear parishioners at St. Mary's and St. Paul's*,

I hope this finds you and your families well in these early weeks of 2024. Last Sunday we celebrated Epiphany, the adoration of the Christ-child by the three kings, representing the nations of the world and revealing that Jesus is the universal saviour. Isn't it wonderful that the Good News of the Gospel has reached our ears! The gospel narrative told us that the Magi were warned in a dream to go home by a different route. In a very real sense, the encounter with Jesus invites each one of us to return home by a different route and the gospels provide us with a trustworthy map.

On Monday the church celebrated the Feast of the Baptism of Jesus in the river Jordan by his cousin John the Baptist and this closed the celebration of Christmastide. It is quite a moment for Jesus for it marks the beginning of his public ministry; there would be no turning back. Baptism literally means immersion and so Jesus immerses himself in water as a sign that he immerses himself in the will of God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, "Father, into your hands I commend my spirit." This Feast marks the beginning of what is called Ordinary Time, the liturgical season devoted to the unfolding of the mystery of Christ in all its aspects. We are invited to follow Jesus closely and so experience, in a personal way, the meaning of this unfolding in the mystery of our own lives, for we are deeply united to Jesus through the waters of our own baptism.

In today's Gospel two important moments take place; firstly John the Baptist points out Jesus as the Lamb of God, the unique sacrificial Lamb whose death takes away the sins of the world; secondly, two of the Baptist's disciples, including Andrew, accept Jesus' invitation to share his life, Come and see, is his response to their question, Where do you live? This is the invitation that Jesus gives to every single person who wants to follow him and his beautiful gospel. In coming faithfully each Sunday to the liturgy and taking our place at the Eucharist, we do see and hear a great deal about the mystery of Christ and what following him really means. Of course at the heart of his message is his wonderful invitation to love God and to love our neighbour as we love ourselves. We all know that this is the message which has the power to transform the face of the earth. Let's make this journey of discipleship together, supporting one another on our pilgrimage through life and transforming the world in which we live. Father O'Brien
